### Father's Message

### Dear Parishioners:

When we were young, our parents most likely taught us early on to say "please" and "thank-you" when asking for or receiving something. Maybe we were taught to say thank-you upon receiving a gift, or maybe it was saying thank-you in our prayers at night to God. The Thanksgiving and Nativity Season always brings up the question...what are we thankful for?

Saint Paul wrote in his letter to the Thessa-Ionians, "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, in everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." When the Thessalonians were brought to the Faith, persecutions broke out upon them which were from God, why were they being victimized? Saint Paul tells them that ultimately it is the offering of love towards everyone, particularly those that were persecuting them, all the while giving thanks to God that was truly needed. For Saint Paul, persecution for the sake of Christ Jesus was a gift of salvation, and believing this, He preached it, and spent His life thanking God for calling him to this path. You see my brothers and sisters in Christ, being grateful and giving thanks, glorifies God. As Orthodox Christians thankfulness is a state of being and our way of life.



The Nativity of Our Lord Jesus Christ

This icon is more than just a beautiful Christmas piece. It conveys important theological truth as all icons do. Jesus is wrapped in swaddling cloths in such a way that he resembles one wrapped for burial. This indicates that He was born to die for us. The red heifer is present in the cave, which is symbolic of being ofmade them begin to ask questions. If they fered as a sacrifice for the sins of the people. The ass which bore Mary and Him out of town for his birth is there foreshadowing the Triumphal Entry as He goes willingly to the Cross to reconcile us to Himself. The angel in the mountains is shown above the three shepherds. This tells the story of how the angel appeared to the shepherds singing and glorifying the birth of Christ, calling them to join in the praise. One of the shepherds is blowing the shofar, which signifies the coming of the year of jubilee or the year of the Lord's favor as in Isaiah 60 and 61. St. Joseph the Betrothed is shown in a struggle against his temptation. The old man talking to him represents his temptation, when he considered "putting Mary away quietly" not knowing whose child she was to bear. The three men on horseback are the Magi following the star that is being guided by God so they can worship the King, Jesus Christ.

> Thy nativity, O Christ our God, hath given rise to the light of knowledge in the world; For they who did worship the stars did learn from them to worship Thee, O Sun of Justice, and to know that thou didst come from the East of the Highest, Glory to Thee,

Having a thankful spirit sets us apart from the rest of the world. It is not only being thankful for having the needed necessities of life, but rather it is being thankful to God for His unconditional love, and His ultimate sacrifice on the Cross granting each and every one of us eternal life if we so choose.

Let us remember that this sacrifice of love through Jesus Christ, the Second Person of the Holy Trinity, who destroyed death by death, granting everlasting life to all, began in a small manger in Bethlehem. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." The Incarnation of Christ intertwines gracefully with that of His Resurrection, for Christ became man in order for us to become like God.

The Nativity is a pivotal point in our history of salvation because it is when God, himself, came to walk amongst us as fully human and fully divine. And on this night, all creation took part in Christ's birth by offering thanksgiving. The angels gave thanks with their song; the heavens gave the star; the Wise Men offered their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh; the shepherds were amazed and gave praise, the earth gave a cave for the birth, and humanity gave the Virgin Mary, the Theotokos, the Mother of God.



So how can we show our thankfulness to God?

- \* We can pray; talk to God often! Say thank-you; He always listens!
- \* We can attend church services.
- \* We can offer our time and talents to others without a cost.
- \* We can do works of charity.
- \* We can be an inspiration and positive model for others.

As Orthodox Christians, our Faith leads us to be thankful because we are living a Christ-centered life walking in His ways as His disciples in the world looking outwards in sharing the Good News of salvation to everyone around us. This brings us to the center of our Faith, to the center of thankfulness, to the center of our road to salvation. A path of salvation that is driven by sacrificial love that was offered by Him in the Highest who grants us every blessing and who we thank, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, now and always and forever and ever, amen.



### Saint Nicholas

### the Wonderworker, Archbishop of Myra

This Saint lived during the reign of Saint Constantine the Great, and reposed in 330. As a young man, he desired to espouse the solitary life. He made a pilgrimage to the holy city Jerusalem, where he found a place to withdraw to devote himself to prayer. It was made known to him, however, that this was not the will of God for him, but that he should return to his homeland to be a cause of salvation for many. He returned to Myra, and was ordained bishop. He became known for his abundant mercy, providing for the poor and needy, and delivering those who had been unjustly accused. No less was he known for his zeal for the truth. He was present at the First Ecumenical Council of the 318 Fathers at Nicaea in 325; upon hearing the blasphemies that Arius brazenly uttered against the Son of God, Saint Nicholas struck him on the face. Since the canons of the Church forbid the clergy to strike any man at all, his fellow bishops were in perplexity what disciplinary action was to be taken against this hierarch whom all revered. In the night our Lord Jesus Christ and our Lady Theotokos appeared to certain of the bishops, informing them that no action was to be taken against him, since he had acted not out of passion, but extreme love and piety. The Dismissal Hymn for holy hierarchs. The truth of things hath revealed thee to thy flock ... was written originally for Saint Nicholas. He is the patron of all travelers, and of sea-farers in particular; he is one of the best known and best loved Saints of all time.

A model of faith and the image of gentleness, the example of your life has shown you forth to your sheep-fold to be a master of temperance. You obtained thus through being lowly, gifts from on high, and riches through poverty. Nicholas, our father and priest of priests, intercede with Christ our God that He may save our souls.

Saintly One, (St. Nicholas) in Myra you proved yourself a priest; for in fulfilling the Gospel of Christ, venerable One, you laid down your life for your people and saved the innocent from death. For this you were sanctified as One learned in divine grace.



In the eyes of every Orthodox Christian, holy icons are more than artful objects. They are a vital part of the liturgical life of the Church and the personal devotional life of the believer. Icons reveal in form and color the veritable truths contained in the Bible and the tenets of our faith. The icon of Christ, for example, renders palpable the mystery of the incarnation of the Son and Word of God. Initially, icons are meant to be didactic. Eventually, they become analogical, which is to say, they help us ascend into the realm of higher truths, allowing us to probe the wondrous mysteries of God's plan of salvation. As such, the icon constitutes a visual theology and a medium of grace. The icon is the point at which our soul encounters and unites itself to the depicted saintly persons or events of sacred history.

The superb iconographic scheme of our Church summarizes visually the whole plan of the divine economy – the sanctification of the human being and the entire cosmos brought about by the Word becoming flesh and dwelling among us. Standing in our beautiful church, surrounded by the holy icons, we are reminded to lift up our hearts and appropriate to ourselves the grace that flows from the saving work of our Lord, God, and Savior Jesus Christ.

Thanks to the generosity of many parishioners, supporters, and friends of St. Catherine, phase three of our Parish Building Program (the interior decoration of the church) was hugely successful. ### **Focus on the Family**

"He who does not have Christ in his heart will never find Christmas under a tree."- Unknown.

Here is an article to share with the parents in your community. Putting Christ Back Into "Christ"mas By Doria Saros

You mean it's not "X-mas" or "gift-mas" or "rush-around-and-gocrazy-mas?" Wow, you could have fooled me! Every year I start the Christmas countdown with the best intentions, and each year I find it more and more difficult to keep my focus on the reason for the season? Christ. As a forty something youth minister and mother of three, I am especially concerned about my own behavior during the Christmas season. According to Group magazine parents are the



unequivocal single most important influence on their child's spiritual growth. If I struggle to keep my focus on Christ during the madness of the shopping season, what am I demonstrating to my own children? The world is a very seductive place in which commercial marketing is frequently challenging our Godgiven spiritual discernment. How many times have we found ourselves so consumed by the material aspect of gift giving that we completely lose focus of the Nativity and our greatest gift, the newborn Jesus?

We need to change our worldly thinking to a more Christian attitude of gratitude. For example in this country, it is traditional to celebrate birthdays by showering the birthday boy or girl with accolades and gifts. So why don't we apply that same tradition for our Lord and Savior? After all, whose birthday is it anyway?! So, what are we going to give Jesus for His birthday this year? I'm not saying that we should stop exchanging gifts. What I am suggesting is that we remember Jesus above all on our Christmas lists. Obviously, the gifts we give to Christ deserve greater effort than the gifts we give to one another. Therefore our "shopping" for Jesus will be more creative than in the usual sense. But here is a tremendous opportunity for us to work with our children in expressing our love for God with a truly giving heart. Here are some gift suggestions for our Lord and Savior: How about giving a donation to a local food-shelf in someone's name for Christmas (adult friends love this)? How about taking the money that we save on groceries during our fasting and donating it to a food-shelf? How about making homemade cards or cookies for someone who is sick or shut-in? How about inviting someone into our home for the holiday meal who doesn't have family nearby? How about giving an elderly member of the community a ride to and from church for Christmas services? How about dedicating more of our prayers to being thankful? How about having the courage to declare "Merry Christmas" or "Christ Is Born," instead of the more 'politically correct' "Happy Holidays."

These are just a few ways to give the gift of glory to Jesus Christ. By keeping our perspective on who Christmas is all about we help put the holiness back in holiday. God willing with each act of kindness we will help spread the news to our children and to our community. Christ is Born! Glorify Him!



### December 4



Saint Barbara was from Heliopolis of Phoenicia and lived during the reign of Maximian.

She was the daughter of a certain idolater named Dioscorus. When Barbara came of age, she was enlightened in her pure heart and secretly believed in the Holy Trinity. About this time Dioscorus began building a bath-house; before it was finished he was required to go away to attend to certain matters, and in his absence Barbara directed the workmen to build a third window in addition to the two her Father had commanded. She also inscribed the sign of the Cross with her finger upon the marble of the bath-house, leaving the saving sign cut as deeply into the marble as if it had been done with an iron too. (When the Synaxarion of Saint Barbara was written, the marble of the bath-house and the cross inscribed by Saint Barbara were still preserved, and many healings were worked there.)

When Dioscorus returned, he asked why the third window had been added; Barbara began to declare to him the mystery of the Trinity. Because she refused to renounce her faith, Dioscorus tortured Barbara inhumanely, and after subjecting her to many sufferings he beheaded her with his own hands, in the year 290.



### December 12

St. Spyridon, the God-bearing Father of the Church, the great defender of Corfu and the boast of all the Orthodox, had Cyprus as his homeland. He was simple in manner and humble of heart, and was a shepherd of sheep. When he was joined to a wife, he begat of her a daughter whom they named Irene. After his wife's departure from this life, he was appointed Bishop of Trimythus, and thus he became also a shepherd of rational sheep. When the First Ecumenical Council was assembled in Nicaea, he also was present, and by means of his most simple words stopped the mouths of the Arians who were wise in their own conceit. By the divine grace which dwelt in him, he wrought such great wonders that he received the surname 'Wonderworker." So it is that, having tended his flock piously and in a manner pleasing to God, he reposed in

the Lord about the year 350, leaving to his country his sacred relics as a consolation and source of healing for the faithful.



### December 22

Reading:Saint Anastasia, who was from Rome, was a most comely, wealthy, and virtuous maiden, the daughter of Praepextatus and Fausta. It was her mother who instructed her in the Faith of Christ. The Saint was joined to a man named Publius Patricius, who was prodigal in life and impious in disposition, but she was widowed after a short time. Henceforth, she went about secretly to the dwellings of the poor and the prisons where the Martyrs of Christ were, and brought them whatever was needed for their daily subsistence. She washed their wounds and loosed them from their fetters, and consoled them in their anguish. Also, because the Saint, through her intercessions, has healed many from the ill effects of spells, potions, poisons, and other harmful substances, she has received the name "Deliverer from Potions." Since the fame of her deeds had spread about, she was arrested by Diocletian's minions, and after enduring many torments she was put to death by fire in the year 290.

# Thanksgiving



The first recorded observance of Thanksgiving in America was a religious occasion that did not include the feast now associated with the holiday. On December 4, 1619, a small group of English settlers arrived at Berkley Plantation on the James River in Virginia. In accordance with their charter, the group observed this day by giving thanks to God.

Two years later, the residents of Plymouth rejoiced in an abundant crop and Governor William Bradford proclaimed a three day harvest festival. The colonists and about 90 Indians enjoyed an enormous feast which included ducks, geese, turkey, fish, corn bread and vegetables. It is this particular feast that is usually referred to as the First Thanksgiving.

Thanksgiving celebrations were observed irregularly in the years after 1621. However, by 1789, the Thanksgiving custom had spread throughout the colonies and, in that year, George Washington proclaimed November 26 as a "day of public thanksgiving and prayer." Washington's proclamation still did not lead to a regular national observance although many states did celebrate Thanksgiving on an annual basis.

In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln issued a proclamation which invited Americans to "observe the last Thursday of November as a day of Thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens." Such proclamations were repeated by the President of the United States for the next 75 years. In 1939, President Franklin Roosevelt changed the date to the fourth Thursday in November. His goal was to help merchants by lengthening the Christmas shopping season. Many Kansans were unhappy with Roosevelt's break from tradition but the move was soon made permanent by Congress.

A typical Thanksgiving meal in the United States includes turkey, dressing, sweet potatoes, cranberry sauce, and rolls.

For centuries, 'Thanksgiving Day' is associated with communal prayers in church and in homes. People offer various meal time prayers during the day. It is a time, when mankind thanks God for all his blessings and grace. It is also a day to show gratitude to your friends and relatives for all the good deeds

The role of the Altar Boy remains a genuine and vital one in the Eucharistic Assembly of the faithful, as well as in other services. He stands ready to serve God in this capacity. It is a stewardship of young men; a service that they offer to God as their regular Sunday offering of talent and ability. In serving our Lord, Altar Boys are able to build off the true form of teamwork and servitude.



### November 9

Saint Nectarios was born in Selyvria of Thrace on October 1, 1846. After putting himself through school in Constantinople with much hard labour, he became a monk on Chios in 1876, receiving the monastic name of Lazarus; because of his virtue, a year later he was ordained deacon, receiving the new name of Nectarios. Under the patronage of Patriarch Sophronius of Alexandria, Nectarios went to Athens to study in 1882; completing his theological studies in 1885, he went to Alexandria, where Patriarch Sophronius ordained him priest on March 23, 1886 in the Cathedral of Saint Sabbas, and in August of the same year, in the Church of Saint Nicholas in Cairo, made him Archimandrite. Archimandrite

Nectarios showed much zeal both for preaching the word of God, and for the beauty of God's house. He greatly beautified the Church of Saint Nicholas in Cairo, and years later, when Nectarios was in Athens, Saint Nicholas appeared to him in a dream, embracing him and telling him he was going to exalt him very high.



### November 14


This Apostle, **St. Philip** one of the Twelve, was from Bethsaida of Galilee, and was a compatriot of Andrew and Peter. He was instructed in the teachings of the Law, and devoted himself to the study of the prophetic books. Therefore, when the Lord Jesus called him to the dignity of apostleship, he immediately sought out and found Nathanael and said to him, "We have found Him of Whom Moses in the Law and the Prophets did write, Jesus of Naz-

areth, the son of Joseph" (John 1.45). Having preached Jesus the God-man throughout many parts of Asia Minor, and having suffered many things for His Name's sake, he was finally crucified upside down in Hierapolis of Phrygia.



### November 17

Saint Gregory was born in Neocaesarea of Pontus to parents who were not Christians. He studied in Athens, in Alexandria, in Beirut, and finally for five years in Caesarea of Palestine under Origen, by whom he was also instructed in the Faith of Christ. Then, in the year 240, he became bishop of his own city, wherein he found only seventeen Christians. By the time the Saint reposed about the year 265, there were only seventeen unbelievers left there. Virtually the whole duration of his episcopacy was a time of continual, marvellous wonders worked by him. Because of this, he received the surname "Wonderworker"; even the enemies of the truth called him a second Moses.



### November 30

Saint Andrew was from Bethsaida of Galilee; he was the son of Jonas and the brother of Peter, the chief of the Apostles. He had first been a disciple of John the Baptist; afterwards, on hearing the Baptist's witness concerning Jesus, when he pointed Him out with his finger and said, "Behold the Lamb of God, Which taketh away the sin of the

world" (John 1.29,36), he straightway followed Christ, and became His first disciple; wherefore he is called the First-called of the Apostles. After the Ascension of the Saviour, he preached in various lands; and having suffered many things for His Name's sake, he died in Patras of Achaia, where he was crucified on a cross in the shape of an "X," the first letter of "Christ" in Greek; this cross is also the symbol of Saint Andrew.



ΤΑ ΠΡΟΕΟΡΤΙΑ ΤΩΝ ΧΡΙΣΤΟΥΓΕΝΝΩΝ – Βρισκομαστε ηδη στα προθυρα των Χριστουγεννων. Σε ολιγες ημερες θα εορτασουμε και παλιν την μεγαλη εορτη του Χριστιανικου κοσμου, τα Χριστουγεννα. Το γεγονος της γεννησεως του Κυριου θα ξαναφερει η Εκκλησια μπροστα στα ματια της ψυχης μας την ενανθρωπηση του Θεου της χαρας, της ειρηνης, και της αγαπης και θα μας καλεσει να προσκυνησουμε μαζι με τους ποιμενες και με τους Μαγους τον γεννηθεντα Βασίλεα. Στο νεογεννητο Βρεφος της Βηθλεεμ θα ιδουμε τον τεχθεντα Σωτηρα μας, τον ενανθρωπησαντα Θεον. Σε αυτο το Βρεφος θα αντικρυσουμε την λυτρωση που «απεστείλεν ο Κυριος τω λαω Αυτου.» Μεσα

στο βρεφικο σωμα του Χριστου δεν κρυβεται μονον ο αιωνιος Θεος, αλλα και το πληρωμα της σωτηριας μας. Δηλαδη, μαζι με τον Θεον κρυβεται και η ανακαινηση και η θεωση της φθαρτης μας φυσεως, η καινη κτιση. Οπως το είπε τοσο ομορφα ο Μεγας Αθανασίος, ο αιωνίος Θεος εγίνε ανθρωπος, για να γινουν οι ανθρωποι θεοι – κατα χαρίν. Ακρίβως δε λογώ της θεολογικής αυτής σπουδαιότητος, η εορτή των Χριστουγέννων αποτέλει μαζι με την εορτή του Πασχά τους δύο μεγάλους πολούς γυρώ από τους οποίους στρέφεται το λειτουργικό έτος. Το Πασχά είναι η κορωνίδα των κινήτων και τα Χριστουγέννα των ακινήτων εορτών. Είδικα, η εορτή των Χριστουγέννων είναι η «μητροπολή» των εορτών κατά τον αγίον Ιωαννήν τον Χρυσοστομον, γιατί το γέγονος που εορτάζουμε κατ' αυτήν είναι η προυποθέση όλων των αλλών σταθμών της σωτήριας μας. Αν δεν εγέννατο ο Χριστός ούτε θα εδίδασκε, ούτε θα

εθαυματουργει, ουτε θα επασχε, ουτε θα ανιστατο. Ηδη με την γεννηση του Χριστου η σωτηρια του γενους μας εχει δυναμει συντελεσθει, Η θεια και η ανθρωπινη φυση εχουν ενωθη εν Χριστω. Ο Θεανθρωπος Ιησους αποτελει την ζωσαν εικονα και την εγγυηση της μελλοντικης εν Χριστω ανακεφαλαιωσεως των παντων.



A television interviewer was walking through the streets of a large city

at Christmas time. He stopped a young woman and asked her, "What is Christmas?" Smiling, she replied, "I don't really know. Is it the day that Jesus died?" In her uninformed response we find a painful truth. Many people have forgotten the meaning of Christmas. The rampant commercialism of our times has sapped Christmas of its sense and import. The emphasis on gift-buying has muddled the waters. The joyous anticipation of the wondrous event of the birth of the Messiah, described simply but powerfully in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke, has taken a back-seat. We need to be more attentive to the Gospel story: "Mary bore a Son, and called His name Jesus, for He was to save His people from their sins" (Matthew 2: 21). We need to remember why Christ came into the world. If our greatest need had been knowledge, God would have sent us an educator; if our greatest need had been technology, He would have sent us a scientist; if our greatest need had been money, He would have sent us an economist; if our greatest need had been pleasure, He would have sent us an entertainer. But our greatest need was to gain forgiveness and freedom from corruption and death. Therefore God, in His infinite love for us, sent us His Son, the sinless and deathless One, to deliver us from the curse of sin and death. In the profound mystery of Bethlehem we discover the simple truth of God's immeasurable love and power. The Son of God bridged the unbridgeable. The Creator became a creature, to deify our human nature, filling us with joy, peace, and hope.
